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

Pursuant to orders of court from the said Court taken out by the Plffs in the foregoing cause, and after previous notice having been given by the Plffs. Spruced at the request of the defendants (the Plffs. having surveyed under said orders and notice,) the attorney and agent of the Plffs both being present, to survey the lands in controversy as follows, to wit: a May 19th beginning at a red oak stump designated on the following plat by the letter A, claimed by the defendants to be the south west, or beginning corner of the Representative of James Calderwood's Survey & 3137 of 100 acres and north west corner of said Calderwood's Survey & 3138 of 100 acres, the stump being at the place pointed out to me by John Story and referred to in his answers to the 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th questions in his depositions on pages 9 & 10 of the depositions herewith returned [to the clerks office] by me in the above causes; also the place pointed out to me by Ralph Knox, and referred to in his answers to the 1st and 2nd questions in his depositions on page 11 of said depositions; and also the same place pointed out to me by William Fisher, and referred to in his deposition in said causes, on pages 12 and 13 in said depositions, running thence south 320 poles, (crossing a spring branch & links water at 57 poles, a spring branch at 194 poles, a branch 7 links water at 212 poles, passing below, and bur-oak at 260 poles, represented on said the following plat by the letter O, easterly corner to John Galloway's Survey & 1149, and north corner to James Dennis' Survey & 4957,) to an open place, designated on said plat by the letter D, where all the timber is small, but few saplings more than 25 feet high, the smaller growth is hazel and thorn bushes very much like places where there have been Indian towns.— Thence S 75° E 408 poles (crossing a dead river at road at 45 poles, pass-

-ing a walnut and elm at 110 poles, with old tree
 marks, block N^o 5 came from this walnut, - crossing
 Head River at 170 poles, - passing two dog woods mul-
 lerry, and white oak at 260 poles, designated on
 said plat by the letter P, east corner to James Dennis's

In make above surveys of Calderwoods I have noted one or more of the corners to each survey laid down adjoining the same. — I had the patents which were granted to Lucas Sullivan in 1800 for the Survey #3137 of 1000 acres, Survey #3138 of 780 acres, and Survey #3139 of 1500 acres, and in the courses called for in said patents, some of the lines were run reversing the courses called for in the patents. — The 1000 acres #3137 beginning with the patent at the point A, as represented on the following plat runs thence S 75° E 400 poles to B thence N 75° E 400 poles to C, thence S 75° W 400 poles to D thence S 75° W 400 poles to the beginning.

The 780 acres #3138 begins at the said point A runs thence S 75° E 400 poles to B thence south 320 poles to C thence N $74^{\circ} 40'$ W 400 poles to D thence north 320 poles to the beginning.

The 1500 acres #3139 begins at the point C runs thence S 75° E 400 poles to E, thence N $74^{\circ} 40'$ E 65 poles to F, thence N $76^{\circ} W$ 610 poles to G, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to H thence S 75° E 400 poles to I, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to J thence S 75° E 400 poles to K, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to L thence S 75° E 400 poles to M, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to N thence S 75° E 400 poles to O, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to P thence S 75° E 400 poles to Q, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to R thence S 75° E 400 poles to S, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to T thence S 75° E 400 poles to U, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to V thence S 75° E 400 poles to W, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to X thence S 75° E 400 poles to Y, thence S $74^{\circ} W$ 480 poles to Z thence S 75° E 400 poles to the beginning.

I meandered Mad River from Ludlow's line top to the point represented on said plat. — also meandered Sugarcamp branch from its junction with Mad River up as far as it is laid down which said sugar camp branch, as well as Mad River is laid on the said plat from the survey thereof.

The said Sugarcamp was 15 links wide at its junction, nearly eddy water; Mad River 26 link water at said junction running rapidly. The said sugar camp branch is about one third as large as Mad River at this place. — The point of James house as represented on said plat by James house is the same as pointed out to me and referred to in the depositions of John Story, John McDonald and
