The United States of America,
 To all to whom these presents shall come Greeting, Know ye, that, in
 Consideration of Military Service, performed by Thomas Waring, a Captain
 for three years to the United States, in the Virginia Line or Continental Estab-
 lishment, and in pursuance of an act of the Congress of the United States,
 passed on the 10th of August, in the year 1790, entitled, "An act to enable
 the officers and Soldiers of the Virginia Line or Continental Establishment
 to obtain titles to certain Lands lying northwest of the river Ohio, between
 the Little Miami and Scioto," and other acts of said Congress, amendatory
 of the said act, There is granted by the United States unto Sandusky Wall-
 ace, assignee of Cadwallader Wallace, who was assignee of the heirs at
 law of the said Thomas Waring, deceased, by Thomas Hord their attorney in
 fact, a certain tract of land containing fifteen acres, situate on the waters
 of Big Miami River between the Little Miami and Scioto Rivers, north-
 west of the River Ohio, as by Survey No. 16,147, bearing date the 14th day of
 February 1856, founded on part of Military warrant No 8700, issued in favor
 of Warner Lewis, and John Lewis, Sons and heirs at law of Susan and Lewis
 who was sister and one of the residuary devisees of Thomas Waring, deceased,
 John C. Thorn and Lucy S. Taylor, Children and only heirs at Law of Lucy -
 Thorn, who was a daughter and one of the heirs at Law of the said Susan
 and Lewis; Ann C. Fortleroy and Mary P. H. Patane, Children and only
 heirs at Law of John Patane, who was a son and heir at Law of Ann
 Patane, the other sister and residuary devisee of the said Thomas War-
 ing; Lucy Waring and Mary Temple, daughters and heirs at law of the said
 Ann Patane; Henry W. Patane, Mary P. Patane, widow and devisee of Thomas
 S. Patane and William C. Patane, Children and heirs at law of the said Ann Patane,
 Thomas W. Lewis, William S. Lewis, John Lewis and Joseph H. Lewis, Children and heirs
 at law of Ann S. Lewis, who was the daughter and heir at law of the said Ann
 Patane, the Children and heirs at law of the said Thomas Waring deceased,
 (the whole thereof being for nine hundred thirty seven acres and one half acres)
 and bounded and described as follows, to wit, Beginning at an ash and
 two Beeches, north west corner to John Hustons Survey No 13,116, thence with
 the line of said Survey south fourteen degrees east one hundred and twenty
 four poles to two maples, south west corner to said Survey, thence with another
 line of said Survey and course thereof north seventy eight degrees east one
 hundred and forty poles to a stake, thence south twelve degrees east six teen
 poles to Beech and Ironwood corner to Robert Meaus Survey No 9973, thence
 with a line of Meaus Survey south seventy eight degrees west one hundred
 and forty six poles to an ash, Sugar tree and oak, north west corner of
 said Survey, thence north twelve degrees west one hundred and forty poles,
 to the beginning. To have and to hold the said tract of land, together with
 all and singular, the rights, immunities, privileges and appurtenances, to the same
 belonging, or in anywise appertaining, unto the said Sandusky Wallace and to
 his heirs and assigns forever.

In Testimony whereof, I, Franklin Pierce, President of the United States of
 America, have caused these letters to be made patent, and the seal of the
 general Land office to be hereunto affixed. Given under my hand, at the
 City of Washington, the sixth day of June in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred
 and fifty six, and of the Independence of the United States, the Eightieth
